ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING -- OCTOBER 26, 1965

The evening of October 26, saw 26 members and 7 guests gather at Elysian Park Lodge for the annual membership meeting of the HPS. Noting that all seven members of the Central Committee were present, this meant that only 19 (or less than 10%) of the general membership took part in a meeting which affects not only this next year (Central Committee election) but many future years (by-law revisions & peak list changes.) The by-laws which were submitted to you before the annual meeting as a special insert to "Summit Summaries" were discussed and amended to delete Article VII Section 6. As amended, the by-laws were adopted. As of this writing, we are now operating under the new by-laws as the Angeles Chapter Executive Committee approved them on December 1. In order to conserve HPS funds, we do not anticipate a reprint of the by-laws as there was no major rewrite. Instead, we ask that you strike out the deleted Section on your present copy.

Peak list additions were Suicide Peak and Castle Rocks. For those of you who are particularly fond of the San Jacinto area, this gives two more good reasons to revisit the area. For those not too familiar with the area, these additions can provide an interesting introduction. No peaks were deleted from the list although several possible deletions were discussed.

In the area of conservation, a resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote urging each HPS member to write to his legislators in Washington, in Sacramento, and locally in support of our conservation projects. Don't forget agency people, cabinet members, or even the President of The United States; after all, the Grand Canyon and the Redwoods are pretty important in our efforts. TRIP SCHEDULE -- JULY, AUG., SEPT., & OCT. ROGER MITCHELL

Deadline for trips to be entered in this schedule will be in ... early April. Therefore, it will be necessary for us to plan the HPS schedule in March. If you have a favorite peak you would like to visit again and it hasn't been scheduled for several years, please speak up. (Especially if you would like to lead.)

If you have a favorite peak that you would like to see added to the official peak list next October, remember that the peak must have been climbed as a HPS scheduled trip. It is anticipated that two trips will be exploratories in the July - Oct. schedule.

Leaders, Asst Leaders, & Transportationists need not attend the schedule planning meeting in order to volunteer for a particular trip or weekend. Just let eny member of the Schedule Committee or Central Committee know your preference from easy one day to strenuous backpack. With approximately 18 weekends available, the Schedule Committee can "attract a broad range of participation."

MONTHLY MEETINGS Just a reminder that all are welcome to attend the regular monthly business meetings of the section. The meetings begin at 7:30 p.m. and are held at Club Headquarters. The next meeting will be January 4. The following meeting will be February 8 (you're right, that's not the first Tuesday of Feb. - but it is Sked 180.) On Sunday, Sept. 26, about 50 peak baggers set out in true Sierra Club fashion to master the wilderness. The trail to our peak, Pisgah, on Yucaipa Ridge, began in an apple orchard with the red fruit hanging ripe and ready for harvesting. (We were tempted, but no one plucked.) The rancher (Mr. Jack Detter) generously permitted to hike on his truck road, and ably led by Bob Van Allen and Ben Romero we soon reached the upper heights. Below, the valleys were blanketed by clouds, and only the summits of San Jacinto and San Gorgonio floated above the white sea.

Our trail, however, was warm and clear and a fox and deer were spotted running through the brush. The younger hikers (Frost, Van Allen and Pettijean families) had a grand time bagging little creatures along with the peak. A lizard and horny toad were admired but for some reason, the older folk failed to appreciate a rather large centipede.

After a leisurely lunch on the summit, we quickly descended to enjoy fresh chilled cider in the famous Oak Glen apple orchards. It was a hike enjoyed by all - right down to the 2 year old daughter of Jim May.

NORTH PK., MIDDLE PK., & OAKZANITA MTN. OCT. 2-3 BOB VAN ALLEN

From early Friday afternoon, through the night, and on to the last minute Saturday morning, people arrived to participate in a many-peaked weekend led by Jan Hawley.

The first peak was North on which there were 37 participants including 12 children. The weather for this peak was, like the rest of the weekend, ideal. After a leisurely paced 3 hour round trip, we returned to camp (at the State Park) for lunch and to start the next official trip to Middle Pk.

However, as so often happens on trips like this, 9 greedy, hotfooted baggers did Cuyamaca Pk. in addition to eating lunch.
Returning in time to start the next trip, seven of the Cuyamacans
were joined by eight others and another leisurely paced hike put
us up the 1100' gain to one of those summits where the view is
breathtaking for about 12' in any direction. Despite this, it is
on Middle Pk. that the beauty of this finely forrested area comes
through the best. The trip up and down more than compensates for
the lack of a summit view.

In the evening we gathered at the park amphitheatre to enjoy the campfire and songtime. The singing of our group (while no competition for the Roger Wagner Chorale) was a source of much merriment. Song leaders were Mona Conn (guitar) and Bobbette Hawley (trying to keep people on key.) After the campfire, amoonlight trip to Stonewall Peak was offered. Three accepted and they now recommend it for a beautiful nighttime view. (1 hrs. RT)

Sunday 8:00 a.m. saw the group ready to caravan to the start of the Oakzanita hike. Eighteen (including 6 children) made the

summit using the long but steady fire road route. This route leaves about 200' of trailless gain (with lots of Manzanita - so beware od shorts) While having lunch on the peak, some talked of showers back at camp, some talked cider and apples in Julian, and as usual some discussed peaks for the afternoon. After a long dry trip back and welcome "refreshments" at the cars, people scurried in all directions having completed another rewarding HPS weekend.

NICHOLS PEAK

It was 100° in the shade in Los Angeles, but warm and pleasant in Weldon where 20 hikers met to caravan to the start of the Nichols Peak hike. About 5 late arrivals showed up as the hike was getting underway. The peak looked easy and it was decided to take the longer sloping ridge to the summit. Most folks looked forward to doing some other peak in the area that afternoon, but looks are deceiving. The sloping ridge became brush and boulders. It was 3:00 p.m. before the fourteenth and last reached the summit. Using a shorter and steeper descent, the last of the group returned about 4:30.

Other than being a very tired out group, it was a pleasant hike. For effort and views it certainly is worth while, rating with the top 25% of the peaks on our list as a strenuous climb.

TECUYA MTN., ANTIMONY PK., & EAGLE REST PK. DAVE STEPSAY OCT. 30-31

After a late start from the Kern Co. Fire Station, due to a mix-up in meeting time, we caravanned to our roadhead at the Sand Springs Canyon Trail. The trail beginning is well switchbacked to get over a ridge and into a valley which provides a very pleasant stroll through meadow and trees to the Tecuya Ridge Rd. (4WD fire road) The register was signed by 17 of the 19 starters. All returned to the cars for lunch. Reports that Tecuya Mtn. was an all day struggle were proven false.

That same day we caravanned to the Lost Luck Gold Mine, parked, and continued on foot down the road and then up to Antimony Pk. Despite the rather warm afternoon, there were no casualties. and all 17 signed in. This trip has about 1800' gross gain for about 200' net.

We then caravanned to Chuchupate Campground where we spent the night (Halloween.) The possible after dinner drive to Frazier Mtn. Lookout mentioned in the schedule did not takt place. Instead we went trick or treating and later joined a troop of Boy Scouts in a songfest around their campfire.

The following morning we were joined by new arrivals for the Eagle Rest hike. We took route 2NO9 (which begins at YMCA camp) 5 mi. to San Emigdio Creek Rd. Doubling back on that road ...

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several miles we then picked up a badly washed out 4 WD road. We kept consolidating people into a fewer number of vehicles. Soon we even had to leave the VW's and were then 18 in Bob Hawthorne's International and George Davis' Jeep truck. After parking the 2 vehicles, we walked down San Emigdio Creek one to two miles to the ridge which leads to a saddle SE of the peak. Some rock scrambling near the summit was encountered, but can be avoided if desired. A different return route was taken in order to provide a quicker descent. From the peak, we headed Slightly SW dropping into a prominent canyon, into the dry creek bed and back out to San Emigdio Creek. Many of the people on the trip stated that Eagle Rest would be recorded as one of the best on the HPS list.

HOW BAILEY

Sixteen hardy and ambitious hikers from HPS, SPS, & DPS assembled on top of Baldy by 7:45 a.m. The air was clear and the views gorgeous at that time. Most had slept at or near the last saddle on the way up.

Going down and along the San Antonio Ridge we were treated to lots of wild life. At least 7 bighorns were sighted, including one whole family, as well as a coyote and a geat. The 3 short class 3 spots caused our experienced group no trouble and the rope was not used, but of course they were time consuming. As a matter of fact the whole last mile is quite slow with a mixture of rock, steep scree and some brush to contend with.

About 11:30,12 of the group, including 13-yr-old Linda Frost, had lunch on "Big Iron." However, the smog was already almost up to our 8000' level, and it continued to rise and fill in the upper East Fork basin all afternoon. This was an added handicap to an already strenuous hike and many found themselves panting more than usual.

The return trip was much slower with almost everyone running out of both food and water. About half the group were still at the base of Baldy at 4:30. The last party (including the leaders) reached the cars at the bottom of the ski lift at 9:30. It was one of the more rugged HPS scheduled trips, but everyone professed to enjoy it.

CUMMINGS MTN., BEAR MTN. NOV. 13-14

After a year of negotiations, six days of scouting, 20 letters, and several telephone calls, we finally found the right people and found them very cooperative and willing to let us pass through their property to these never-before-scheduled- andclimbed peaks. We think it very fine of these folks who keep up the roads and gates to let us use them after the vandalism they suffer during deer season.

Twenty-three members, no guests, drove to within 4 miles and

a 2000' gain of Cummings Mtn. for a pleasant hike through Christmas.tree forest, Jeffrey Pine and White Fir, colored by falling Kellogg Oak leaves. Although skies were cloudy, visibility of Angeles, Los Padres, and Sequoia Forest mountains was unusually good.

Sunday, the same group (with 2 guests and some exploration over wrong roads) found the owner on the Bear Mtn. Ranch, C. J. Harasta, a friend and former member of the Sierra Club. He hopped into his Jeep and directed us over the best route (cow and deer trails) to the summit of Bear Mtn. The big rain that started that weekend kindly held off with a slight drizzle just as the last stragglers were getting back to the cars.

We wish to thank the Austins, Campbells, Keenes, Cummings, and Harastas for their kindness, cooperation, and directions that made two very enjoyable days for us. We hope that neither this write-up nor other oral accounts will spur anyone to trespass or bother the owners with requests. We want to keep our good relations so we can schedule another trip sometime.

ASBESTOS, SANTA ROSA, & TORO

NOV. 21-22

Ten Sierra Clubbers met under threatening skies at Pinyon Flats Campground just off Hwy. 74 and left as scheduled for Asbestos Mtn. As the group took only about 90 minutes to go the 2 miles to the summit, return to the cars provided the group with much time for exploration of Asbestos Springs ans its abandoned buildings and fixtures.

With most of the group dining out, and later a very pleasant campfire, the rain during the night seemed to bother no one. Bright and early the next morning, 9 people in 3 cars left from Hwy. 74 and found that the road had been regraded so that driving to Santa Rosa was no problem. Desert Steve's (no relation) cabin on Santa Rosa was open but deserted. The view from this point was very poor due to low clouds.

Proceeding from Santa Rosa the group encountered a locked gate marked "No Trespassing - Government Property" in Marine Corps colors. (The gate is just beyond Virgin Spring but there is plenty of room to park.) The group hiked along the road, through a T. V. relay station, and then up a steep road to a Marine Corps squipment storage building in 1 hour. Contrary to rumors, no viscious dogs were encountered. On the return, the group dropped down to the saddle between the two peaks on Toro and down the draw to the road and found themselves only about ten minutes from the locked gate.

As the group arrived back so early, they decided to try for another peak, immediately after lunch. The peak selected was Lookout Mtn. and consisted of a very real bushwhack. Once upon the top, a fire break was noted which would have provided a much easier route and it was this easier route which was taken back to the cars. Thus, many of the group had a four peak weekend.

The scheduled trip to Antsel Rock was changed to Apache Peak and Spitler Peak due to problems relating to the season. The group for the trip consisted of 11 HPS members which included 8 emblem holders.

The day started with low hanging clouds so that neither peak was visible. Directions for approaching the trip were given by the ranger at the Pine Springs Ranch. He suggested going up the road on the Cedar Crest Ranch until we came to the campground, then backtrack across a horse trail to a jeep trail that originates at the Bonita Vista Ranch (the BVR discourages hikers.) We found the campground alright but some how missed the horse trail. After beating through brush for about one-half hour, we finally found the jeep trail. The jeep trail ends at a locked gate. After this a reasonably good trail takes one to the ridge between Apache and Spitler.

By the time we reached the ridge the weather had cleared up. We then went to Apache over a light snow. For those interested, there are two points on Apache. The point on the west is the high point. On this peak, Jim Van Allen became the 114th emblem holder. Because of extremely high winds and the resulting coldness, we decided to have lunch at the saddle between peaks.

While we were having lunch, the clouds suddenly moved in again. The result was a trip to Spitler in the clouds. Fortunately, Spitler is a relatively easy peak to find (there's only one high point.) At the top we were just barely able to see if everyone was there. The trip to the cars was uneventful and was accomplished in about 90 minutes.
