NOV 11-12, 1967

Joint HPS -
Y's Hikers

Walker Pass was the meeting place for 25 Antelope Valley Y's Hikers, HPSers and guests. A short 4 mile caravan took us to the trailhead for Pinyon Peak.

This peak, and Onyx Peak, were being explored for possible additions to the HPS qualifying list. Pinyon Peak lived up to its name as many pinyon nuts were gathered during the hike. Barbara Lilley must have gotten 5 pounds of them.

Saturday night we were joined by more HPSers at our camp at Robbers Roost.

By 7:30 a.m. our number had swollen to 40 persons as we started the 32 mile caravan to Nichols Peak trailhead. All hands who started this 2 1/2 mile, 2400 foot gain hike signed in at the register. Much discussion centered around the location of the register. It is at the survey marker on the western most of the two peaks. The peak 300 feet easterly appears to be several feet higher.

Onyx trailhead was reached by a 4 mile caravan to the south of the peak. Sixteen of the more determined hikers signed in after an hour and fifteen minutes scamper to the top. There is about 1000 feet of scree slope that makes for a fast descent of this peak.

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HINES PEAK

The weather had once again taken the initiative by washing out the only road to the trailhead. This was a repeat of the condition experienced on our previous attempt made earlier this year.

To the 38 eager would-be-participants assembled in the cold, wet, grey Sunday dawn, the announcement of trip cancellation was a disappointment. However, undaunted, they expressed interest in pursuing the leader's suggested alternate climbs.

The first alternate attempted (Ortega Peak and Ortega Hill) offered a discouraging locked gate at the entrance to the access road leading up Cherry Canyon from Hwy. 33.

This suggested that the second alternate (Reyes Peak) would be a better choice. The party proceeded further north on Hwy. 33 to the start of the 8 mile access road at Pine Summit. Bob Hawthorne explored road conditions in his 4-wheel drive wagon only to discover the road impassable.

The third attempt was just too much, and the total trip was cancelled.

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IN MEMORIAM

Joe Darrow, a friend to all who ever climbed with him and an emblem holder in the HPS, died of natural causes while climbing Picacho Del Diablo in Baja California on Thanksgiving weekend last.

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Ed Stork and I left Humber Park near Idyllwild at about 7:45 p.m. and hiked up the Devil's Slide - San Jacinto Peak Trail to about 8900' where we found a nice area for bedding down. We proceeded a short distance the next morning to the Strawberry Cienega trail junction and hid our gear. In attempting to climb Marion Mtn. while avoiding both brush and a perhaps troublesome ridge, we arrived on the peak to the NE of Marion but finally made it to Marion itself. We then went over to Jean and contoured around San Jacinto to Folly Peak where we had lunch. The views were very poor as it was quite hazy.

After lunch, we crossed over San Jacinto Peak on down to Miller Peak (how about that!) and then dropped down to Tamarack Valley from which we climbed Cornell with its somewhat tricky stretches at the top. Longing for refreshments at the tram but settling for the cool waters near Round Meadow (absolutely plush in its greenery), we returned to the trail junction earlier mentioned and picked up our gear. Here too, we met Sam Fink, who had also climbed Cornell earlier, and we all hiked out together getting to the cars about 6:30 p.m.

Hiking a couple of hours in the evening can do quite a bit for a trip like this and persons leading trips in the future might consider this device where there are several miles of good trail. Last year, I hiked to Dollar Lake on a Friday evening after work and it made quite feasible a trip which otherwise would have been a drag at best. That trip consisted of the aforementioned evening hike and doing Shields, Anderson, San Bernardino East, San Bernardino, and Charlton on Saturday (camped at Dry Lake View camp) and Dobbs, Jepson, San Gorgonio, Lake, and Grinnell and out via Dry Lake on Sunday.

On a one-evening and one-day trip, often a summit bag with sleeping bag slung below will be ample for necessary equipment and supplies. ART DE GOEDE

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APACHE, SPITLER AND
PALM VIEW PEAKS

DEC 9, 1967

This climb did not go as planned. We were refused permission to cross private land for the most direct route. The local early morning restaurant on which some depended went out of business the week before the climb, leading to the tardiness of one of the leaders and others. In the absence of one leader, Ken Ferrell enlisted the capable assistance of Les Stockton to start the group up the trail to the crest of the ridge, south of Palm View. The wind was strong and very cold. We regrouped at the Desert Divide Trail junction and proceeded to the summit of Palm View (7140+) with over 40 people signing in there about 9:30. Twelve people left the group at this point, some going to Pyramid Peak, some to Cone Peak, and some directly back to the cars. The temperature was in the 20's most of the day.

The main group, reduced by this split to 29 people, proceeded toward Spitler. Three of these, who wisely decided to conserve their energy, did not finish the climb up Spitler, but lunched and waited near the saddle between Palm View and Spitler. Twenty-six reached the summit of Spitler (7360') about noon and had lunch there. The cold wind was blowing hard. Ten people under the leadership of Dr. Bob Funke and John Backus started the return to the cars via the same route we had taken up.

Sixteen people, in a close, fast moving group, went on to Apache (7567') arriving at the summit a little before 2:00 p.m. It was too cold and too late to stay on Apache long. The sixteen started the long trek of 7 or 8 miles back to the cars,

mindful of the fact that the sun sets early. Some of the canteens were freezing up. On Palm View we caught up with the group that had started the return from Spitler, and made the return to the cars in a group of 29, arriving there about 5:30, shortly after dark.

Ken Ferrell did an excellent job leading the whole trip, and the assistance of others, called upon to take responsibility for splinter groups, is greatly appreciated. The writer, who brought up the rear, offers humble apologies for his late arrival and promises to put in an order for less severe weather next time.

Three eager members of the HPS comprised the total group that climbed high on the ridge above Murrieta Saddle to establish a base camp. The night was windy and cold, but beautiful and clear, with a full moon that just wouldn't quit.

Breakfast was early, amid the splendor of a glorious sunrise, and the party was well on its way toward Monte Arido by 7:20 a.m. The route was varied with a mixture of trail and road, with recent bear tracks thrown in for added interest.

Everyone attained both summits, where they enjoyed the unusually clear visibility, which afforded a panorama large enough to include the whole HPS Peak List.

As a Sierra Club contribution to the Los Padres National Forest - Trail Maintenance, the leader conducted a trail clearing exercise on a badly overgrown section connecting the road and trail saddles on Old Man Mtn.

The party's hurried return to base camp was delayed momentarily to enjoy the spectacular sunset, which afforded a backlite view of San Miguel Island. After a brief pause at base camp, to enjoy a cup of coffee while packing up, the group started the longhike out to the cars, arriving at 7:30 p.m.; thus ending a wonderful trip.

Early Saturday morning it looked like the HPS was going to create a traffic jam in Palm Springs. After a short car shuttle, the roadhead looked like a good sized used car lot. I thought that this would be a trip which would draw a fair sized group so 3 assistants were planned instead of the usual one. It turned out that there were 56 participants for the rock climbing session at Tahquitz Canyon.

Specific areas had been designated for various kinds of climbing practice and the groups rotated. Shortly after lunch we left Tahquitz Canyon and moved to our camp at Sheep Pass in Joshua Tree National Monument. After setting up camp we spent the balance of the afternoon in route finding and rappel practice.

It had been a long day with lots of exercise so supper was a welcome break. And - that is what it proved to be - a break - because after supper we had 35 people make a most enjoyable hike to the summit of Ryan Mtn. The full moon that had been

ordered appeared on time and was in just the right place to benefit the hikers. The summit was windy but the views were terrific. Some (most) climbed in their sleeping bags soon after returning from Ryan (between 8-9 p.m.). As usual, there was a hard core of experience relaters that kept a campfire going for some time; they proved the old adage 'the first liar hasn't got a chance'.

Sunday a.m., before dawn, an eager group (including some of the hard core noted above) made a moonlight ascent (additional 3rd class practice) to the top of a nearby pinnacle to view the sunrise. The group returned to camp just as breakfast was ready. About 8:30 we piled into all the VW's, 4 w.d.'s and a Dodge van and headed for Queen Mtn. Of the 39 starters, 37 made the summit. Again we were able to add to the 3rd class experience aspects by choosing an appropriate route up the summit block. We had planned to eat lunch after returning to the cars. However, most people ate their lunch on the summit (about 11 a.m.) - obviously planning to eat again back at the cars. After returning to the cars it took us only a few minutes to return to camp and even a shorter time to get ready to go to Quail Mtn. On Quail, the hikers had dropped to a total of 24 - and all 24 made the summit.

A quick descent was made to the cars and all was haste to break camp so we could get to Eureka for sunset.

Eureka, by any standard, is a long drive and a short climb. To make it more worthwhile, I prefer to do it about sunset. I think the 23 who made the trip may agree.

It was a long weekend filled with lots of activity. A number of people got their introduction to 3rd class rock, some got an introduction to hiking, some to the HPS way of life - but to many it was a great opportunity to spend another weekend in one of our favorite HPS areas.

The canyon is abundantly provided with tables, seats, swings, plenty of pure mountain water, and everything that is necessary to make it the most complete place for pleasure and enjoyment. From the front page of "The Times" Sunday, May 22, 1927 -

"REMEMBER THIS - 'On the road to success the secret of getting there is to keep out of the ruts'."

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
