#### CHAIRMAN'S CORNER

The ever increasing number of members in the Sierra Club as well as the overwhelming interest in the outdoors by the general public presents new and challenging problems for those who guide our policies governing outings.

With turnouts for local hikes now often numbering in excess of 75 and Sierra trips where the leaders are required to enforce reservations in order to limit numbers, we are faced with a problem nearing the critical stage long before we are sufficiently prepared to handle it.

To organize a trip and prepare the necessary details takes considerable time by the leaders. Two persons can effectively plan and control a group of 30-40 persons for a day's hiking, but a similar number for a week-long backpack would probably require four leaders. How can we effectively schedule weekly outings for numbers in excess of 100, which has occurred on various popular outings six times this past year? The first solution would seem to be that we need more leaders. True, but we must consider the training required to make leaders available for trips takes considerable organization and the experience comes only with time. Further, we must also consider the impact on the area in our plans.

The problems this presents are becoming acute and will require prompt action to facilitate the long-term solution. Should we schedule conflicting trips to perhaps reduce the numbers on any one hike? What are the alternatives?

The former policy that HPS outings would be the only ones to present peak climbs in the local mountains by necessity was dropped due to the need for more leaders and broader coverage. Local hikes and group trips have helped in this regard.

I do not pretend to know the answer to this problem, but on behalf of the Section, will present it for consideration at the next Advisory Council meeting. The recommendation will be that a study team be established from the hiking sections and other interested groups to establish policy recommendations for approval by the Council and ratification by the Executive Committee of the Chapter. These will then serve as guidelines for future scheduled outings by all Angeles Chapter members.

Current Mountain Records Committee interest regarding the area of our official "Peak List" is expressed in the recent recommendations presented to the membership for consideration. These suggestions took the form of offering additional and more meaningful guidelines with the thought of establishing definite criteria for a more comprehensive policy on future additions and deletions.

### Annual Membership Meeting Results

The three items pertaining to mountain records that were presented for consideration to the membership at the recent meeting were: (1) Peak list criteria (2) Deletion of 10 suggested peaks (3) Addition of 3 peaks. Considerable interest was aroused, thereby increasing the participation during the discussion of the issues. The voting members expressed their wishes as follows:

- Adoption of criteria as a guideline in all future peak list considerations (9/68 Lookout)
- Deletion of 2 of the suggested 10 pks./mtns., Baldy Mtn. and Table Mtn. from the list.
- 3. Adoption of all 3 suggested additions, Onyx Pk. #2, Pinyon Pk., 10,000 Ridge.

October 13, 1968

I had a feeling when I left home about 5:30 a.m. that it was going to be rather lonely on Mt. Lowe by myself. Noone had called and only one other person had said anything about participating in the work party. Fortunately, the turnout was better than I had thought it would be. After getting a permit at Red Box, six of us proceeded to Mt. Lowe with four others arriving a little later.

A new register book which contains some Mt. Lowe history and pictures of Rubio Hotel and the Inclined Railway, Echo Mountain House, the Electric Trolley and the Alpine Chalet was placed in the new cairn made from available stones on the summit. The viewing-tubes were given a nice bright coat of paint and the name of the peak it is sighted on was stenciled on each side. In addition, broken glass and old cans were removed from the summit area and trail maintenance was done from Markham Saddle to the summit of Mt. Lowe.

The recent article on Mt. Lowe in the Herald Examiner apparently created a new interest in the peak. MT. BADEN-POWELL ROSS MOUNTAIN

CONE PEAK THOMAS MTN.

October 20, 1968

Forty-eight hikers turned out on a beautiful fall day for the bushwhack assault on Cone Peak. There were kids, and also several of the "old timers" with outstanding HPS records. We followed a trail of sorts past Hop Patch Spring, and then up to the saddle between Cone and Palm View. From there it was pretty brushy back to the peak, but all but two made it. About half the group signed in on both rock summits, but a level indicated that the more northerly of the two, the easier one holding the HPS register, is actually the higher. There was a fancy celebration for a 200-bar, a 100-emblem and a birthday. A more direct but steeper route, also brushy, was taken down. This went south to the first saddle, then left down a valley (keeping right of a tree-covered rocky mound about 2/3 down) right to the cars.

After collecting all the strays and would-be rescuers, we headed to Thomas Mtn. With a terrific burst of energy, we made it a full 1/4 mile from the Lookout to the high point, and then back to the cars for more celebrating! Two emblems and another birthday were recognized with the biggest party yet -- champagne, peaches, brownies, two cakes and more champagne.
