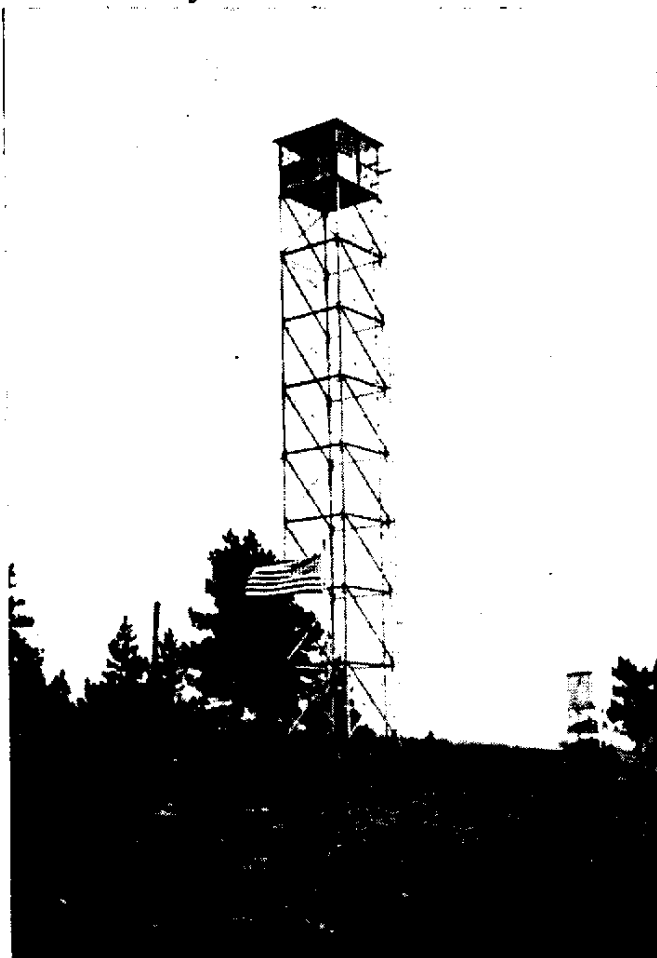

RELEASE AND WAIVER OF LIABILITY AND INDEMNITY AGREEMENT

I Hereby acknowledge that I have voluntarily applied to participate in mountaineering and/or mountaineering instruction or training, hereinafter referred to as "activities".

I am aware that the activities are hazardous, involving risk of serious bodily injury, death, or property damage and I am voluntarily participating in these activities with knowledge of these dangers including, but not limited to, slips, falls, objects or persons falling on persons, equipment failure, injury from pointed equipment, high altitude injury, improperly administered first aid, lightning, hypothermia, and/or drowning.

As lawful consideration for being permitted by the Sierra Club or any of its officers, agents, servants, volunteers, activity participants, or employees, herein referred to as releasees, to participate in these activities and/or use their equipment, the undersigned does for him/herself, his/her heirs, executors, administrators, legal representatives, guardians, distributees, and assigns, collectively referred to as releasors, hereby release, waive, discharge, and relinquish any action or causes of action for personal injury, property damage, or wrongful death which may hereafter arise from the activities or any pursuit incidental thereto wherever or however said pursuit may occur and for whatever period said activities and pursuits may continue. The undersigned further agrees that under no circumstances will releasors prosecute or present any claim against releasees for any causes of action, for personal injury, property damage or wrongful death, whether the same shall arise by the negligence or non-intentional conduct of any of said releasees from the activities or any pursuit incidental thereto.

The undersigned and the remaining releasors hereby agree to indemnify, save and hold harmless the releasees and each of them from any loss, liability, damage or cost (including attorney fees) which releasees may incur as a result of injury, death, or property damage to the undersigned, or from suit from such personal injury, death, and/or property damage to the undersigned.

This document is intended to be as broad as is permissible under the law of the State of California and this agreement shall be interpreted under the laws of the State of California. If any portion of this agreement is invalid, it is agreed that the balance shall continue in full force and effect.

The undersigned has read and voluntarily signs the release and waiver of liability and indemnity agreement and further agrees that no oral representations, statements, or inducements apart from the foregoing written agreement have been made.

The undersigned acknowledges that he/she has read the foregoing paragraphs and is completely aware of the potential dangers incident to engaging in the activities, and is fully aware of the legal consequences of signing the within instrument.

Of Politics and Responsibility

It should come as no surprise to anyone in the Section that this is an election year. It is also a year in which 2 important pieces of wilderness legislation are before Congress, the Desert Protection Act and the Condor Range and Rivers Protection Act. There are a number of groups opposed to these bills and they are looking for ways to discredit the Sierra Club and other environmental groups in order to force compromises or to derail the legislation.

There has already been one instance where CORVA (California Off-Road Vehicle Association) has intentionally distorted one of our outings, a perfectly legitimate one which followed all rules and regulations, in trying to get concessions from Sen. Seymour on the Condor Bill. There is no way we can stop them from doing things like this. They have hired very expensive lawyers full time to come up with ways to fight us and they are looking for anything that can help their cause.

What we can and must do is to make sure we continue to follow all rules and regulations on our outings. It sounds pretty simple but rules constantly change and we need to keep aware of them especially when going into some of the more remote areas of Southern California. When leading trips for the section or when going on private outings, you might wish to call up the ranger office that is responsible for the area to find out about possible road closures, special camping regulations or other pertinent information. Sometimes this information saves

time or aids in the preparation of possible routes when doing peaks, particularly when dirt road driving is concerned. Your forest service map contains the necessary phone number and addresses for the routes that are within their boundaries. Otherwise call one of the BLM offices or State Parks regarding routes within their territories (we will try to get this information into the Peak Guides in the near future).

If you are knowledgeable about the historical, botanical or geological aspects of some of our peaks, please consider writing an article for the *Lookout* and share some of this information with the members of the section. There are many interesting and unique assets that are found in our local mountains that few of us know about.

Several other leaders will don complete their requirements for I-rating. The Landfill Siting Policy drafted by Robin Ives was adopted at the 3/20 ExComm meeting. The policy outlines a method by which Los Angeles and Orange County governments can find the best sites for future dumps. I strongly supported this measure. Instead of just reacting to dump proposals we don't like (such as putting a dump on top of the Elsmere Canyon archeological site right in the national forest), now we can exert leadership and point the way for responsible government decisions.

The AQMD Market Incentives Program you probably read about last month in the newspapers was backed by your Chapter, as well. I'm enthused about this as well, adapting market forces to aid conservation.

In the last two months, the Chapter also:

- Asked Norwalk voters to approve restrictions on the Norwalk Defense Fuel Supply Point.
- Asked Orange County to end the Caspers Park gravel operation.
- Supported keeping bike lines on PCH in Huntington Beach.
- Asked the DA to make Anheuser-Busch stop spilling into the Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Reserve.
- Supported the LA City Tree Commission Task Force.
- Supported EIRs for Webb Canyon development, near

Your writeup must be submitted to your Sponsoring Group Outings Chairperson. (A duplicate copy is recommended.) Your writeup should include all the information your prospective participant will need to know in order to sign up without telephoning you. If that would make writeups overlong, give basic information and request, "Send sase for detailed information.", or say, "Telephone leader for more information."

The Schedule uses 90 letter spaces. Set your typewriter for 45 letters and treat each line as half a Schedule line.

- (2) Date and section heading, **ALL CAPITALS** — month is 3 letters only. If joint sponsors, separate by a dash.
- (3) Level of technical certification: **C, O, I, M, E, T.**
- (4) Elevation of peak in parenthesis following name of peak.
- (5) Never use apostrophes to indicate an abbreviation or contraction. use "nat!" not "nat'l" for national.
- (6) Underline title that is to be in bold face type, including (3).
- (7) For all hiking and biking events, give distance, elevation change and general statement of level of difficulty.
- (8) Map directions use one letter only: **E, W, N, S, R, L.**

- (9) Never use "thru" for the word "through", or "lite" for "light" or "nite" for "night."
- (10) Never use periods after abbreviation, use LA not L.A. for Los Angeles.
- (11) On the hour is 8 am other is 8:15 am or 7:30 pm.
- (12) Reservation information possibly including deadlines, space limitation, experience, deposit and check payable, sase, H&W phones, carpool info, rain cancels, S.C. Number.
If participants are to meet at carpool pt. or trailhead, be sure to give detailed location and the time of the meeting.
- (13) Never use all capitals to abbreviate self-addressed, stamped envelope, use "sase" not "SASE."
- (14) Names of leader and asst., **ALL CAPITALS.**
- (15) Never use a hyphen in the word "writeup."

called the Idyllwild Ranger Office two days prior to find out the latest in conditions. They informed me that there was a new trail and that they were constructing a new trailhead nearby (although it was not clear where it would be built). We drove the short distance down Hwy 74 just next to the Sugarloaf Cafe in front of the gate on 7S01. No sign of a new trailhead, so we walked along this road for 1/2 mi to where the dirt road comes down from the Elks Lodge (standard route starting location). There was a new gate under construction to keep people from illegally driving onto 7S01 and down to the mine (it has been illegal to drive down there for many years but ardent 4WD'ers have breached the dirt barricade

designed to keep them out). The new trail starts here and is marked by an obvious sign. It goes east following an old jeep trail then drops down into a small gully before reaching the old Dolomite mine, a definite savings from the old trail.

We had already lost one participant, Janet, who was not feeling well. The rest of the group proceeded through the mine and finally onto the Cactus Spring Trail, the only maintained trail in the Santa Rosa Wilderness. Permits are still not required so we were allowed to take any number of participants although as it turned out we would have been within the standard size of 15 anyway.

followed this interesting trail as it winds over diverse geography of pinyon flats and cool riparian streams dotted with cottonwood trees and desert willows. This was one of those trips which almost didn't make it. The harsh floods of February had wrecked havoc over Ventura County and made many areas inaccessible. Fortunately for us, we were going in from the bottom using the old 22 mile route and we had 2 dry, warm weeks for things to settle down before the trip.

Our meeting time was 6:30 am at the Matilija Ck Trailhead but it wasn't until 7 when everyone arrived. The road in from Hwy 33 was passable but in poor shape (local residents have to use it). Still 12 hearty hikers showed up and shortly began the march. I warned everyone that we would have a major stream crossing about ½ mile up the road. There is a little more distance now as the gate has been moved back about ¼ mile and you have to walk through the newly acquired wildlife sanctuary (no bicycles allowed).

After a few minutes of walking we came to the stream and easily forded the 80' width with its icy clear water. Most of us waded in the knee deep swift current but a few managed to cross the precarious rocks piled by a road grader that cleared the road to the houses further up the canyon. We followed the road out of the canyon and past the private property. There were many landslides over it and several sections were undercut making it impassible for vehicles (only the forest service is allowed to drive this

portion). Water was seeping out everywhere and the roar of the stream below could be heard all the way to Murietta Divide. There are some nice sections along the way through thick groves of oaks recovering well from the devastating fire of 1986. Several cascading streams were crossed with giant ferns covered overhead by budding alders. The ceanothus was in bloom and we could smell the fragrant white flowers as we ascended. Bright yellow bush poppies were also beginning to show and we saw another bright yellow flower we guessed to be a primrose.

After the divide, we began the long and tiring climb along the ridge. The road, unlike the hiking trail that preceded it, makes no effort to go around the bumps. Its sole purpose was to maintain the firebreak that separates the Matilija and Santa Ynez stream basins, the effectiveness of which is dubious given the relative ease the 86 fire had crossing it. Still there are superb views along the way out over the ocean to the Channel Islands. High clouds and a cool breeze on top of ridges made nearly perfect hiking weather and the long walk more enjoyable.

Five and a half hours and 11 miles since the start, we finally ascended the seemingly endless ridge to the top of Monte Arido. Small patches of snow were found among the very few shady places. We grouped around the scrub oak to stay out of the chilly wind and enjoyed our well deserved lunch. A half hour later, it was time to get moving again.

We descended the long ridge and everyone went up to Old Man which we reached around 3. From there, we followed the route back about 100 yards, then took a short cut due south to the road which worked out well. Then it was a long, long walk back to the divide with those several hills to climb on the way down that are so easy to forget. I allowed the 4 front runners to go ahead as a group from there while the rest of us took a more leisurely walk down and

back to the cars. We had to make the cold stream crossing in total darkness but the water felt nice. We were all out by 7.

Nearly everyone had had enough and went home. Only Bob was interested in camping out while 2 others were spending the night in Ventura and planned to join us on Sunday. However, the weather report was for an 80% chance of rain on Sunday and the storm was due that night. I waffled for a while trying to decide what to do. The thought of spending a night in an area hard hit by floods with little chance of hiking the next day did not seem appealing (we would only be able to do Chief). So we copped out and went home. Everyone got what I promised, a good winter workout.

Condor Alert

Thank Senator Seymour, but we still must stop the dams on the Sespe!. Ask the Senator to support the full 55 miles of Wild and Scenic designation on the beautiful Sespe Creek — the centerpiece of our wonderful Sespe Wilderness! And to press forward for immediate passage of this important legislation.

Name, Origin, and/or Historical Significance of Muir Peak: (Contributed by Louis Quirarte)

John Muir (1838-1914), great naturalist, distinguished scientist, mountaineer, and widely considered to be the originator of the conservation movement in America, founder of the Sierra Club (that has since devoted itself to the preservation of the earth's scenic and ecological resources), voted by the California Historical Society as California's most "outstanding citizen", and who has been singularly honored with perhaps more place names in California than any other man (but glaringly none in the southern part of the state which he often wrote of and loved) deserves to be further honored by having "his" peak officially named for him. Muir hiked to the top of this peak in August, 1877. His route to the summit is clearly described in "Bee Pastures of California" in *Century Magazine* (July, 1882) and in four of his works including *The Mountains of California* (1894).

The name may have originated from John Muir's friends, Dr. And Mrs. O. H. Conger with whom Muir stayed while visiting the area. They lived in Pasadena near this peak, according to W. F. Bade's *The Life and Letters of John Muir*. Muir once wrote to Louise Conger jokingly asking "whether my peak is still up there." The name is also reputed to have been given by Dr. Harold C.

Bryant, later Superintendent of Grand Canyon National Park. Still later, Muir's Friend, William Colby, frequently described it as "Muir's Peak."

The first known published record of any name for this summit is "Muir's Peak" appearing as footnote 405 in Hiram Reed's *History of Pasadena* (1895). "Muir's Peak" continued as the use name for many years. This form was used in Sarah Noble Ives' *Altadena* (1938) and Shirley Sargent's *Theodore Parker Lukens, Father of Forestry* (1969). However, another name has also long been in common use as is attested by local newspapers, such as the *Pasadena Star-News* which published "Muir Peak" in an article "High Peaks Near Altadena Bear Names of Noted Men" (1941)

"Muir Peak" dates from its informal dedication by a group of 56 Club hikers led by Wandalee Thompson on April 24, 1949. A summit photo of the group was printed on the cover of the Angeles Chapter newsletter *Southern Sierran*. This showed a wood sign which read "Muir Peak elev 4685 ft" sic. (June, 1949). This sign was prepared under the direction of then Angeles NF District Ranger M. W. Durham, who (perhaps more aware of the conventions for naming geographic features) dropped the possessive apostrophe and changed "Muir's" to "Muir." Thompson led another hike to her "Muir's Peak" in May 1941. Since then, "Muir Peak" has been used (without exception) as the Sierra

Club use-name for this summit, and (so far as we know) by everyone else who climbs it today. The Angeles Chapter History Committee attests that numerous official outings appearing in the Angeles Chapter Schedule have since singularly used "Muir" as the proper name of this mountain.

Hiking the Great Basin: The High Desert Country of California, Nevada, Oregon, and Utah

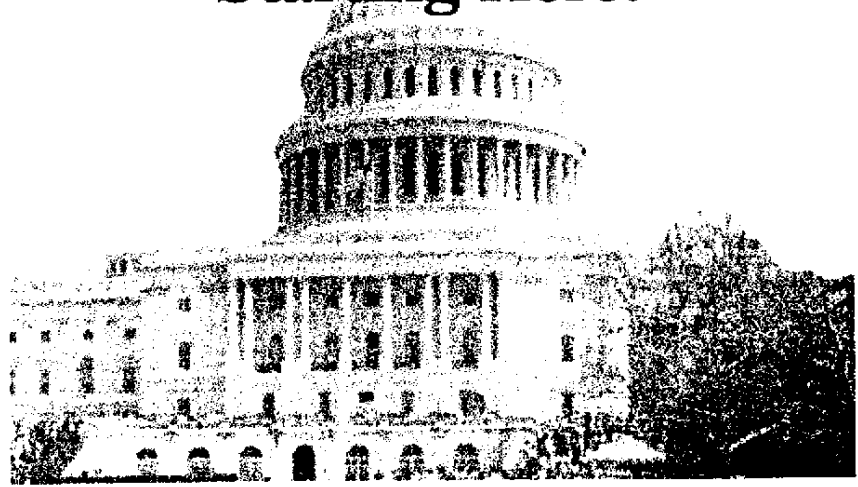

Hiking the Great Basin covers the high desert country of Nevada, Utah, Oregon, and California (with portions of Idaho and Arizona). The region encompasses hundreds of mountain ranges (with peaks rising to as high as 14,000'), groves of juniper, pine, and aspen, lush meadows, and numerous streams and lakes as well as the painted canyons, talus slopes, and sagebrush typical of Western deserts. The famous bristlecone pines—the oldest trees on Earth—are found in the Great Basin, as are the elusive bighorn sheep, and relics of early Indian civilizations.

In *Hiking the Great Basin*, veteran hiker and guidebook writer John Hart describes more than 90 routes—over mountain ridges, across desert expanses, and along canyon rims. Routes range in difficulty from easy nature walks to advanced cross-country treks. For the

Hiking the Great Basin includes detailed trail and campsite descriptions, elevation keys, extensive map references, water sources, supply points, the best seasons to visit, and desert road and driving conditions. The managing agency and wilderness status of each area is provided. 47 regional maps are included.

Introductory chapters give an overview of the region's geology, ecology, climate, desert plants and animals, and history, and a special section explains such controversial issues as the "Sagebrush Rebellion," mining threats, water battles, and military pressures.

I recommend this book highly for those of use who occasionally wish to explore areas outside of the Southern California area. You will quickly find yourself modifying some of your travel plans to include some of these hikes.

About the author: John Hart is the author of several Sierra Club outdoor guides, including the bestselling *Walking Softly in Wilderness*, *The Sierra Club Guide to Backpacking and Hiking the Bigfoot Country*, and *The Wildlands of Northern California and Southern Oregon*.
