The next morning Theresia led an HPS hike in the local mountains. Returning home after the hike Theresia felt weak and dizzy, and was taken to a nearby hospital. Shortly after being discharged from the hospital, she collapsed in the hospital parking structure and was taken back into the hospital. Theresia died at the hospital. She was 46 years old.

I'm really looking forward to see you at the HPS meetings and meeting you on the trails.

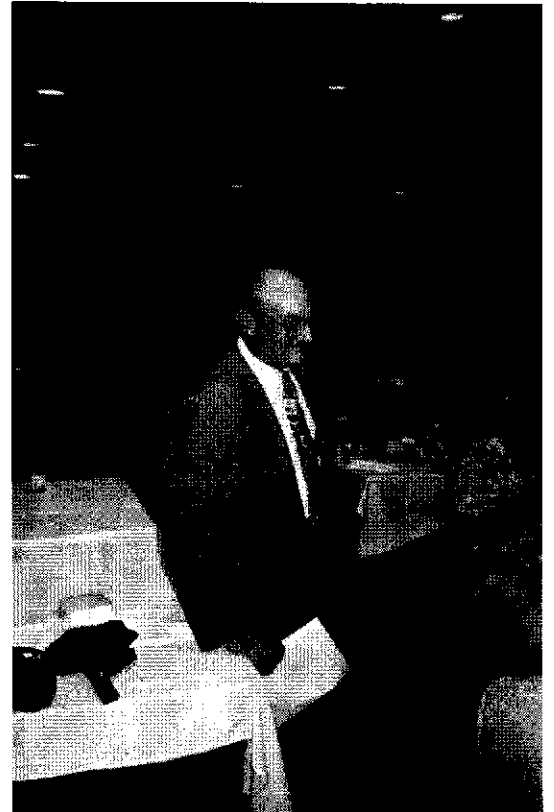

Banquet attendees applaud Frank Goodykoontz as he is announced as the only person to have led the HPS List three times.



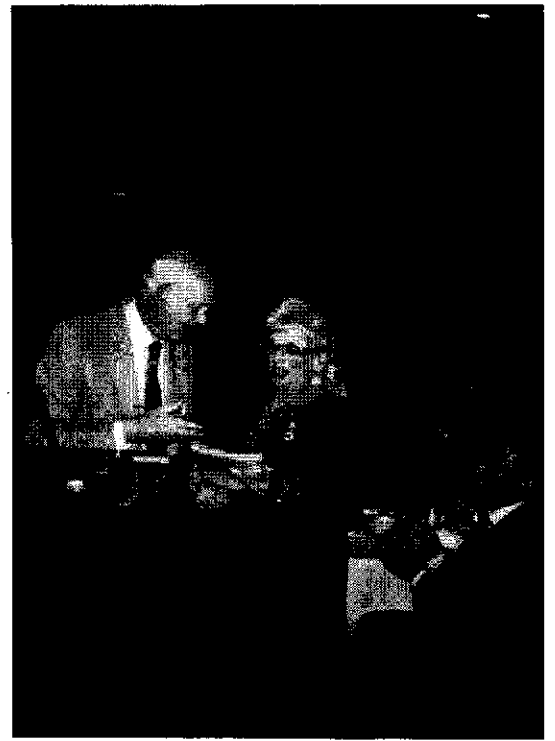

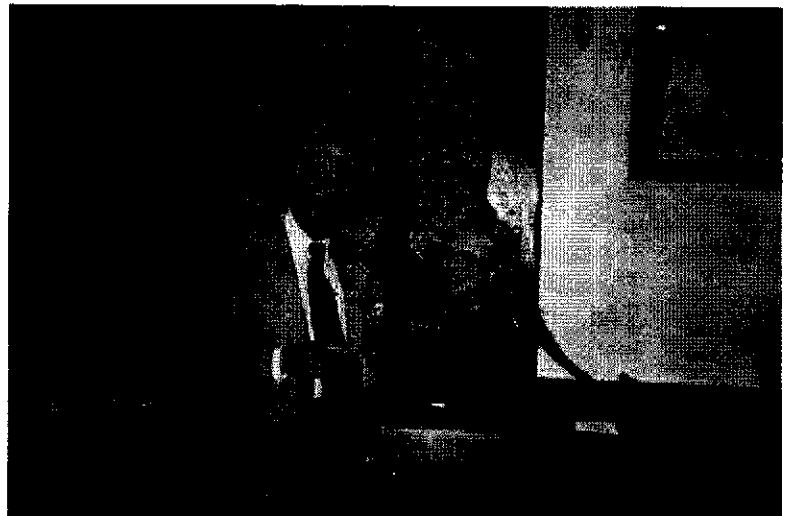

In Memory of Theresia Glover

I regret to inform you that our dear friend, leader and member of the 1995 Management Committee passed away tragically Sunday night. She led an HPS hike Sunday in the San Gabriels, became ill toward the end of the hike. She sought medical help in the evening, but to no avail, she expired around midnight January 28, 1996.

Theresia was a great person and a great friend of the HPS. She led the most scheduled hikes in the Section in 1995. She was a relatively new "I" rated leader, winner of the new Bill T. Russell New Leader Award at the HPS Banquet Saturday evening before her death. This was the first time this award was given, and it was received by a deserving new leader in the Section.

Theresia was radiant and beautiful at the banquet the night before we lost her. Her professional life as a teacher was very successful, her success in the HPS was obvious and her personal life very satisfying. She traveled around the world and she just spent a month visiting her family and friends in Australia.

I feel that if we had to lose her, she went at a time when she was very happy. But she will be sorely missed.

One day 2 winters ago, I was on my way up Whale Peak on the pathfinder route. I had been there before and was just roughly following the

map when someone asked what our elevation was. Several of us made approximations with a range of 400'. Theresia pulled out her compass, took a quick bearing or 2 and announced an elevation. 10 minutes later, all of the I rated leaders on the trip agreed on an elevation, Theresia's! We all encouraged her to go for her I rating. It came as no surprise to learn that she had passed her Nav Noodle on the first try.

Last winter, when I damaged my knee, Theresia was always ready and willing to take my place as a leader. She did an excellent job as leader on all these trips in spite of not having the opportunity to scout the peaks as she would like to have.

Last Thanksgiving weekend, I was her coleader for Theresia's Hundredth Lead on Monument Peak. She changed her plans for that for that weekend to accommodate my limited hiking ability. I was happy to vote to recognize her as the first recipient of the Bill T. Russell New Leader Award.

Theresia was a good friend. She always had positive things to say about everyone. She encouraged others when they faced difficulties. She will be missed.

I was very saddened by Theresia's passing away last Sunday, January 28. It will take me a long time to get over it. As I sit here now five days after the loss of a close friend I am remembering the good times we have shared.

Sunday January 28 was

a beautiful sunny day in the morning changing to overcast in the afternoon. We climbed those easy peaks around Mt Wilson: Markham, Lowe, San Gabriel, Disappointment, Deception, Harvard and Wilson. It was a twelve mile hike with 3700' gain. For the first 2 or 3 hours of the hike I was in the back with Theresia as we walked along and visited. It was like we both had the future stretching forever in front of ourselves. Her's more than mine because I'm 8 years older. When I said good by at the end of the hike I had no idea nor did she that it would be the last day of her life. How fortunate I was to have been with her.

October 3, 1992 was when I first met Theresia on my HPS List Finish hike. I was leading "Baldy from the Village," a strenuous 12 mile round trip hike and 5800' of gain. Baldy was first then over to Harwood on my List Finish. These completions are such joyous events. I saw Theresia the next day on Paula Peterson's HPS List Finish on Sunset. We were having a celebration in the parking area below Sunset.

I remember other countless great hikes with her. We were both participants on Beauty and Iron Springs in March of 1993. She was really starting to get hooked on the HPS. It was great having a long talk with her as we hiked up Beauty above the earthen dam.

Last May 23 on my 200th lead on Black #3 in the Tehachapis I found out that she would be moving back to Australia in about 5 years. I

hoped she would never move back. Coming off of Black that cold afternoon about 5 pm seems an unlikely place to find a rattling rattlesnake in a log I stepped over. It was a good conversation piece anyway.

A month later in June when it was over 100 degrees in Yucca Valley Theresia stayed on as a rated leader so I could lead Chaparrosa. She was trying to lead the List and get her 100th lead on Monument Pk on November 26, 1995. Everyone else had gone home including my original other leader. We waited until about 4:30 pm to leave the Stirratt's house for Chaparrosa. Austin Stirratt was our only participant as they both proceeded to hike me into the ground in the hot weather.

She became an "I" leader last summer, and I signed her off on both hiking trips required for the "I" rating, which would qualify her to lead cross country trips. They were a lot of fun as all of the hikes she led in a relaxed and confident manner. Everyone loved her as a leader.

W will never forget when we led San Gorgonio, Jepson and Dobbs last October 8. It was a make-up for our HPS backpack last summer when we only got Charlton. That evening Richard Schamberg and I were way in the back going down to the Vivian Creek trailhead where the vehicles were parked. It was well after dark in the freezing night air with Ron Young and Theresia way up

front. We all made it back just fine even though I can't see in the dark. Richard and I had a midnight lead in Denny's in Redlands. Theresia didn't join us because she had to teach school that morning.

She was a such a very special friend to me that I felt I could call on the phone at any time and pour my heart out to. I will miss her a lot. I will always treasure the many memories I have leading trips with her and the many peaks we climbed together. We were going to be tent mates for Mt Shasta, a 14,000' volcanic peak in northern California, this July. I won't have a tent mate but I will go for it just the same with her in my heart.

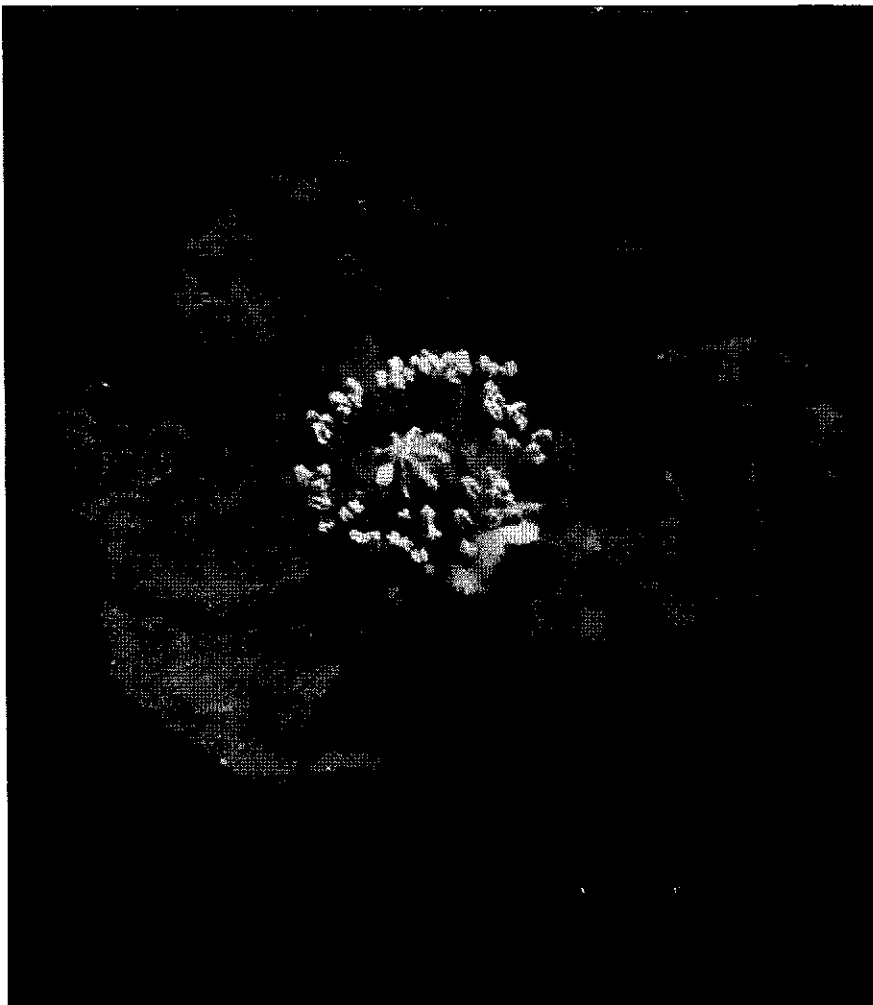

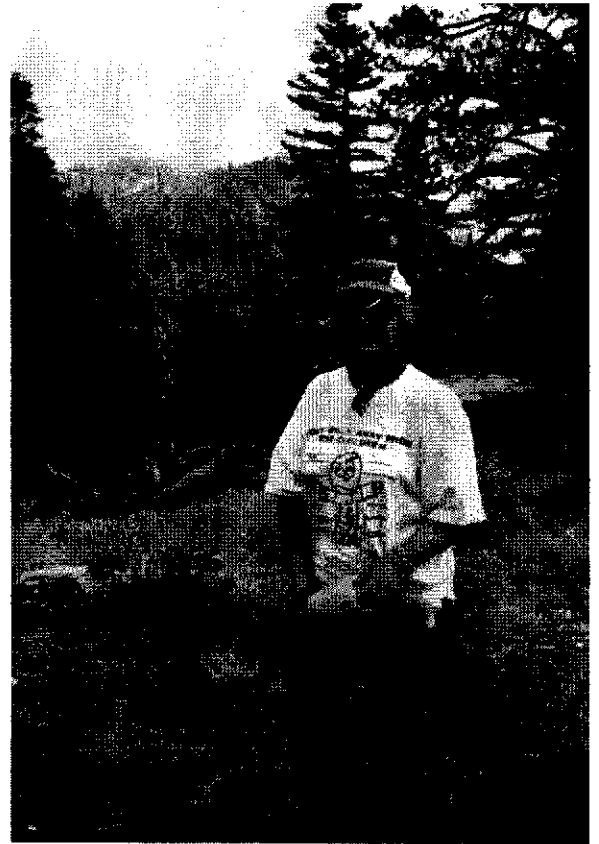
I visited Tasmania, an island state of Australia, last year. Theresia lived and owned property in Tasmania. She told me it was a beautiful place. I concur.

Current Trip Reports

Bighorn Mtn

January 10, 1996

Leaders: Jerry and Nancy Keating

Who would have predicted shirt-sleeve climbing in early January on the northeast fringe of the San Bernardino Mtns? Not the weatherman, but four HPSers demonstrated their savvy by choosing this date for a balmy climb from Bighorn Canyon. Not a cloud appeared in the sky, and visibility was unlimited all day.

We proceed up canyon past a dry waterfall, then turned west into a wash that went easily until it became quite rocky. After scrambling to a sandy platform beyond, we abandoned the wash and climbed on ridges to Pt 5641', then continued westward on easier terrain to the summit plateau. Much to our surprise, as well as theirs, two motorcyclists were enjoying the view from just beyond the summit (5894'). Apparently unaware of the vehicle prohibition, they had come up via old roads starting in Rattlesnake Canyon.

On descent, we climbed back over Pt 5641', but did not drop into the wash used on ascent. Instead, we headed further east on an easy ridge, then dropped directly into Bighorn Canyon via a rather steep, boulder filled gully. Total gain for the

day was approximately 2,400 feet. Besides the leaders, the participants were Tom Hill and Neal Scott.

The driving instructions for this route in the May 1992 guide sheet are erroneous. Here is what we recorded: From California Hwy 247 in Johnson Valley, take Bighorn Rd (graded) south 2.0 miles to Cholla Ave. Turn left (east) on Cholla (also graded) and proceed 0.4 mile. Turn right (south) and proceed 1.5 miles into Bighorn Canyon where there is ample parking. 4WD vehicles can proceed another 0.1 mile up the canyon, but the additional drive in sandy terrain isn't worth it.

Another way to reach the roadhead is to turn right (east) at the intersection of Bighorn Rd. and Cholla. After about 100 yards, turn left (south) and join the other road in the bottom of Bighorn Canyon. The first part of this option has a firmer surface than the other, but it also has more rocks. From the junction of the two dirt roads, the parking area is 0.4 mile farther up the canyon.

Rosa Point

January 13, 1996

Leaders: Frank Goodykoontz, Carleton Shay, David Jensen

Perhaps it was the date, or the possibility of very warm weather, or the fact that there were thirteen hikers in the group. In any case, these

omens conspired to give us a rather late start at 7:05, when we struck off across the desert towards one of the more unfriendly peaks on the list. After hiking about a mile, Frank turned back because he wasn't feeling well, so Carleton took over with Dave Jensen assisting. From then on it was uneventful, and while warm, it was not uncomfortably so. We kept together by pausing more frequently than one would on a less-than-relentless 4800' gain peak.

The fastest hikers reached the summit at 12:45, and the last ten minutes later. We took a 20-minute lunch and headed down, determined to make it before dark. We reached the cars at 5:25, after sundown, but with lots of light remaining. All in all, a very satisfying day! The participants were Kevin Doyle, Mike Fredette, Jack Haddad, David Michels, Virgil Popescu, Hanna Shay, Austin and Betty Sterrett, John Wells, and Robert Young.

Winston Peak, Winston Ridge, Mt Akawie

September 23, 1995

Leaders: John Welles & Penelope May

It was a beautiful, sunny, blue-skied, warm day when John Wells met a small group of HPSers to conduct his provisional "O" Hike up these

now only barely a friend) fell suddenly with an "injured" ankle. Our fearless leader John rushed to the sorry scene...Jerry was writhing in agony. As John investigated the medical emergency, asked questions and felt (for what?!!) the ankle, with Jerry's wife Lucy cooing reassurances, Ron May felt the call of Mother Nature and went on ahead to allegedly relieve the situation during this unexpected delay. 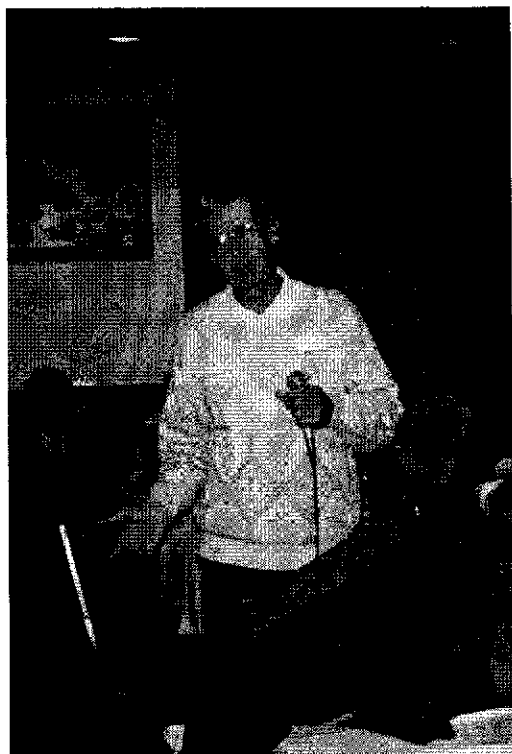
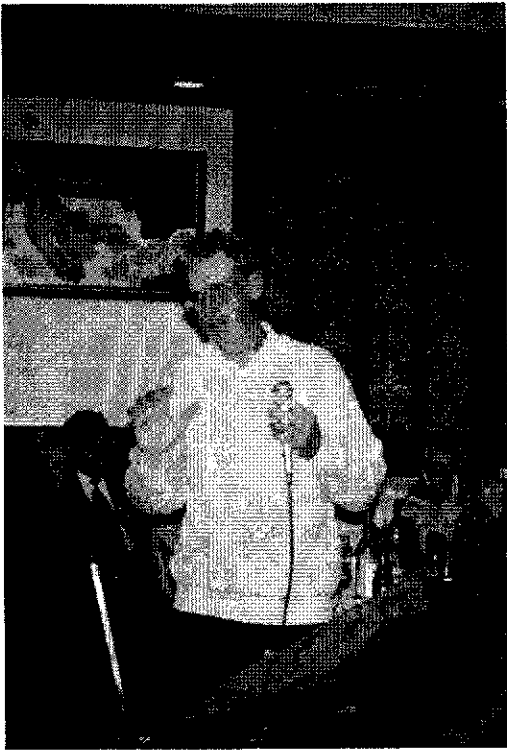

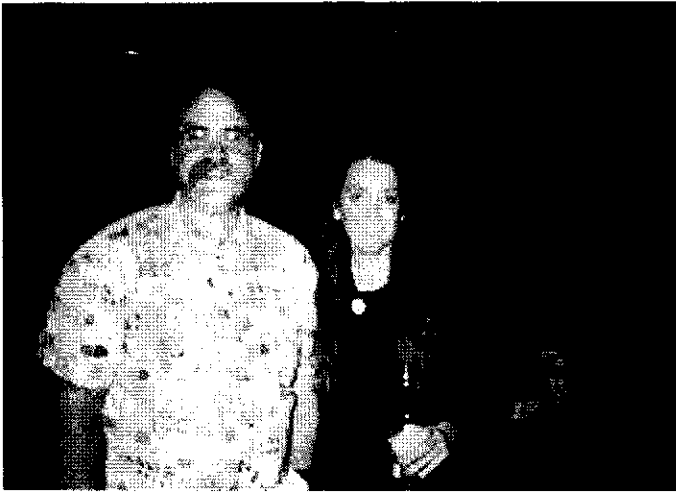

From the Safety Committee

Pets: Pets shall be permitted only on outings that are pre-advertised as pets-permitted outings (exception: seeing-eye dogs). Pets-permitted outings must be only to places where pets are legal and must be only to places which are acceptable to the chapter's outings and conservation committees.

Cultural Resources: Chapters, groups, and sections must take care not to negatively impact these important prehistoric and historic resources in any way.

Transportation: Leaders cannot take an active role in making arrangements for participants' transportation. The leader supplies directions to the trailhead, but transportation arrangements, including ridesharing, are the responsibility of the participants. Club insurance does not extend to owners, drivers, or passengers of private cars. Riders customarily share expenses with drivers. The contribution varies with the vehicle, the numbers of riders, the road condition, etc. A suggested amount is 10 cents per mile per person.

Mountaineering Insurance:

Mountaineering is now permissible. Please check with me for details.

Screening Trip Participants:

Leaders are responsible for the safe and hopefully enjoyable conduct of outings. They act as agents of the Club in making the judgments necessary to prevent participation by people who may not meet the established criteria. Some individuals will be unhappy with being denied involvement in an outing of their choice. But that is the unfortunate consequence of making responsible judgments in this regard.

Minor Consent Form: Persons under 18 years of age who are not accompanied by a parent or guardian must have written permission from same giving phone number and authorization for medical treatment in case of emergency. See the schedule or contact me for a form.

REGISTER BOX By Jim Adler

During the last two months, reports removing eleven registers from the missing and deficient list were received. There were no new listings.

Reports were received from Larry & Marianne Shumway, Walter Studhalter, John Gibba, Peter Doggett, David Jensen, and Jack Trager.

Jack Trager reports that he concealed a register on Sunset Peak in a cleft in the boulder in the middle of a thicket northeast of the lookout foundation where it is necessary to climb the boulder and reach down to the can.

Walt Studhalter sent a picture showing his placement of a can set in a tiny ledge on the west side of the summit block of Mt. Waterman.

Peter Doggett reports finding by means of altimeter and inclinometer that the highest point on Mt. Wilson is a point .4 miles northwest of (and 40 feet higher than) another high point near the old snack bar. He indicates that he intends to present his findings to the Management Committee and the Mountain Records Committee. The plot thickens! The March 1992 peak guide already lists two possible high points.

Book Review



Newton B. Drury and the Wilderness Preservation Movement, Mount San Jacinto State Park By Richard Carter Davis. Published by the California Department of Parks and Recreation, September 1989.

In the November December 1995 issue of the HPS **Lookout** Bob Michael, in the "private trip reports" section describes bagging a "new" 10,000' peak called Drury Peak. Bob asks in his write-up "Who was Newton Drury, and how does he merit having this peak named for him?"

I have the answer to Bob's question.

I received several letters about Bob Michael's trip report stating briefly who Newton Drury was, but Peter Yamagata sent me a copy of a small (20 page) booklet which is the subject of this review. The booklet consists of two sections, one entitled "A Brief History of Mount San Jacinto State Park and Wilderness," and the second "Newton Bishop Drury, Father of the Mount San Jacinto State Wilderness."

The first section

describes the eighty year long struggle to preserve the "wilderness conditions" of Mount San Jacinto. The Sierra Club, the Save-the-Redwoods League and others worked to include the area in a state wide system of parks. In 1930 the United States Forest Service and the California Department of Parks agreed that this land would be administered as a wilderness.

But in 1937 Palm Springs civic leaders began to call for construction of an aerial tramway and development of winter sports facilities on the mountain top. In 1945, Governor Earl Warren, eager to encourage post-war economic activity, signed an act creating the Mount San Jacinto Winter Park Authority, and the tramway was authorized. Construction was completed in 1963. However, due to the efforts of the Department of Parks and Recreation and environmental groups, no additional facilities were ever built in the area. In 1963, the Department changed the name of the area to "The Mount San Jacinto Wilderness State Park."

Newton Drury's role in all of this, as described in the second section of the booklet, was considerable. Drury, born in 1889, was executive secretary of the Save-the-Redwoods League from 1919 on. On their behalf he wrote and lobbied for legislation creating a statewide systems of parks. According to this booklet, Drury demonstrated that "public parks could be created through cooperation with extractive industry..."

Drury was later appointed to the State Parks Commission.

Drury helped broker a purchase of land from the Southern Pacific Railway to complete the consolidation of the acreage needed to establish the wilderness. The park was dedicated in 1937, just prior to Palm Springs' announcement of its intention to build an aerial tramway.

In 1940 Drury was appointed Director of the National Park Service. He served in this position until 1951. He returned to California and was appointed by Governor Warren to be Chief of the Division of Beaches and Parks. He served in this position until 1959. Among other successful defenses of the San Jacinto Wilderness he blocked an attempt to build an aerial tramway from Idyllwild. He successfully blocked the San Jacinto Winter Park Authority's efforts to build the tram from Pal Springs until his mandatory retirement in 1959.

Drury then returned to the Save-the-Redwoods League and served as executive secretary, president, and finally as chairman until his death in 1978.

The booklet also points out that Frank A. Miller, prior to his death in 1935, hosted many meetings of local park enthusiasts and government officials at his Mission Inn in Riverside. He was one of many Riverside County citizens who began the crusade for Mount San Jacinto State Park. Miller Peak, ½ mile east of the summit of San Jacinto, is named for him, according to this booklet.
