## Dick Worsfold, HPS Chair in 1959 and 1963, Passes Away

Dick Worsfold, born in 1905 in Waukegan, Illinois, passed away on February 2, 1998. Dick served on the HPS Management Committee from 1959 through 1964, chairing it in 1959 and 1963, and received the R. S. Fink Service Award in 1980. Dick was Emblem Holder no. 66, bagging Alamo Mtn in August, 1960, and qualified for the 200 Peaks Bar on San Rafael Pk on June 4, 1974. Dick is survived by his wife Henrietta, his sons Richard and Peter, daughter Sharleen, nine grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Dick came to California at the age of eight. Early in his life he knew he wanted to be a cinematographer. He filmed several silent movies, and added subtitles to them. In 1938 he joined MGM where he would work for thirty years. One of his brilliant efforts is remembered

in the opening sequence of the movie "Patton," where the American flag unfurls. For most of his career at MGM Dick worked in the matte painting department. After 1968 Dick worked for a short time with 20th Century Fox.

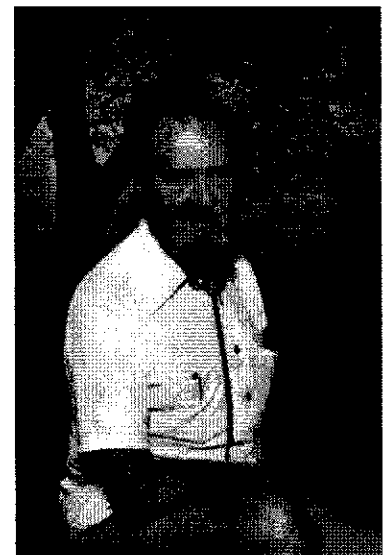
Dick's first wife, Lottie, passed away in 1958 from Lou Gehrig's disease. However, she had originally been diagnosed with this disease seventeen years earlier, and given only two months to live at that time.

He met Henrietta, whom he called "Jetje," in the Sierra Club on a local hike. Henrietta recalls her first outing with Dick was to Mt. Vetter. Henrietta and Dick married in 1960.

Dick loved hiking, especially extended backpacking in the Sierra Nevada. He often took his children and grandchildren on trips.

He hiked until his late 80's when a hip injury caused him to use a walker.

Dick's last HPS appearance was on December 14, 1995 at a HPS social program event.

## In Memory of Dick Worsfold

### Adventures With a Gentle Man

Dick Worsfold passed away on February 2nd of this year. He had been in declining health these past few years, yet it still came as a shock to me. As Chapter Historian, one of my chief duties over the years has been to write the "obits" on many of our more well-known Sierrans. This one, however, is more personal than most because of the many fine hours I spent on the trail with Dick as an up-and-coming peakbagger in the 1970s.

The first occurred during a rest break when I plunked down beside Dick and watched with fascination as he calmly observed a mosquito land on his forearm, scittle around for a tender spot, and fill up with a load of blood. As the sated insect buzzed off, Dick saw my quizzical look and said matter-of-factly, "mosquitos have to make a living, too." On the same trip, Dick gently removed ticks from himself, not so much out of concern that they might have imbedded themselves in his epidermis as much as his desire not to harm these fellow creatures. He was a gentle man who possessed great respect for the natural world and all its inhabitants.

My other story stems from our infamous descent of Gobbler's Knob, an insignificant peaklet in the eastern San Gabriels. It was Dick's habit, as a former two-time Chair of the Hundred Peaks Section, to help some of the closet and wanna-be peakbaggers among the retirees, housewives, and unemployed who composed the "Wednesday Hikers." Gobbler's Knob was one of dozens of hikes he either led or otherwise organized during his tenure as Chair of the Local Hikes Committee

I was serving as an unofficial assistant leader, and it was under my urging that Dick elected to take our group of trusting participants directly down the mountainside, thus bringing upon us a painful but invaluable lesson about the follies of taking shortcuts. The last 200 yards to the cars were blocked by near-impenetrable chaparral. As the leaders, we each took turns crashing, crawling, and cursing our way through the Thorny jungle in a 3 hour race against darkness. I'm sure I did all the cursing. Dick was too much the gentleman to ever vent his frustration in such a manner. In fact, Dick remained calm throughout the whole adventure, even suggesting how interesting it would be to bivouac overnight in the brush only a few yards from our cars! We emerged in the last twilight, in tatters and bleeding from dozens of wounds--scars to be carried with a certain lunatic pride by each of us for a lifetime.

So here's to you Dick. Wherever you are, may the passageways always open up before you in the chaparral of the hereafter.

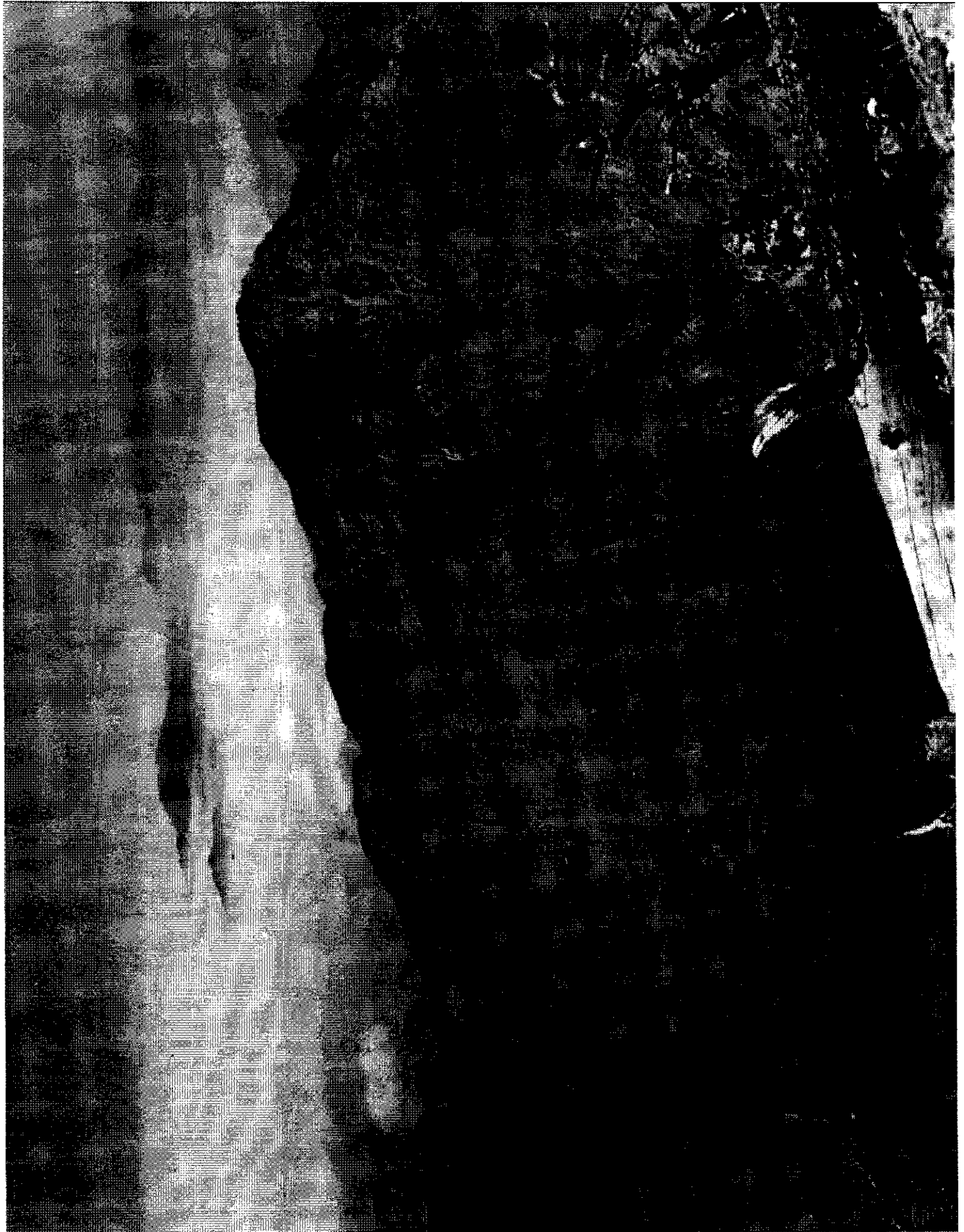

## RECOGNITION

Emblem status is awarded to those active members in good standing who have climbed 100 peaks and have been members for over six months. Other awards include the 200 peaks bar, list completion, multiple list completion, pathfinder emblem (100 peaks by two different routes), and leading 100, 200, and all peaks.

## CLIMBING GUIDES

The HPS Mountain Records Committee publishes climbing guides and map extracts for each peak. These contain information on driving and climbing routes, access restrictions, etc. *The Lookout* has order forms. Some of the HPS map extracts are based upon older versions of the USGS topographic maps, resulting in unavoidable variations among the elevations shown on the map extracts, the peak list, and the climbing guides. ## PEAKS & USGS MAPS

The listed maps are USGS topographic maps, 7½ minute, 1:24,000 series. The USGS has a useful free pamphlet, "CALIFORNIA - Index to topographic and other MAP COVERAGE" that locates these maps. Elevations, in feet, are taken from the maps. A + sign indicates the highest contour line on peaks without a spot elevation on the map. The first listed map contains the listed peak. Additional maps are named for peaks that are near a map edge or corner, or that have a part of the usual climbing routes on adjacent maps.

## UTM COORDINATES

UTM (Universal Transverse Mercator) coordinates are useful for specifying locations on a map: peaks, road junctions or points on a climbing route. The UTM grid is defined by fine black lines on recent maps and by blue tick marks along the edges of older maps. The lines (or tick marks) are one kilometer apart and each has a unique two digit identifying number. A location to the nearest 100 meters is given by a six digit number. The first two digits are the eastward coordinate from the top or bottom edge of the map and the third digit is the number of tenths of a kilometer to the east of the grid line. The fourth and fifth digits are the northward coordinate obtained from the right or left edge of the map and the sixth digit is the number of tenths of a kilometer to the north of the grid line. For example, Etiwanda Peak (17F), which is not named on the map, has UTM coordinates of 473874. This means that Etiwanda is 300 meters east (third digit) of the grid line defined by the blue tick marks that are numbered "47" on the top and bottom edges of the map. Similarly, it is 400 meters north of the grid line numbered "87" on the left and right edges of the map.

## Current Trip Reports

### **Caliente, Reyes Pk, Haddock Mtn** **November 1-2, 1997** **by Patty Kline**

A group of 15 people met on at 7 am at the intersection of Hwy 166 and the Soda Lake Road. Saturday was led by Patty Kline, David Eisenberg and Carleton Shay; Carleton led only on Saturday. We arranged ahead of time for a BLM ranger, Kathy Sharum, to meet us and be our escort and guide for the day. She works out of the BLM Office in Bakersfield.

We consolidated vehicles at this point and drove west to the turn off for the Caliente Ridge Road. Here we turned left to the Selby Parking Area. At this point we did further consolidation into 4x4 or high clearance trucks to drive on the ridge itself. Kathy had the key to the locked gate which let us in several more miles. This road is very rain sensitive because it is adobe. Any heavy rains, even 5 days ahead of the anticipated travel date make this road impassible. In a spring such as this El Niño year it could be a sea of peanut butter for up to 6 weeks and therefore a no go.

Kathy pointed out many flower specimens. This was a road walk the entire way with many animal tracks on the road. There are many endangered or threatened species that live on the Carrizo Plain Natural Area where Caliente Mountain is located. Examples the giant kangaroo rat, the blunt-nosed leopard lizard, the San Joaquin antelope squirrel and the San Joaquin kit fox. Kathy caught a snake for us (not endangered) for us to touch and photograph.

During lunch on the summit we determined that among us were the following "celebrities:" 4 SPS Past Chairs, including Paul Lipsohn (1973), Duane McRuer, (1976), Bob Hicks, (1979), and Gene Mauk (1980); and 3 DPS Past Chairs, including Paul Lipsohn, Duane McRuer and Patty Kline. There were also 3 HPS Past Chairs: Carleton Shay, Dave Eisenberg, and Patty Kline. The other participants, not to be slighted, were David Zalewski, Kathy Price, Jim Adler, David

Wells and our ranger Kathy Sharum.

After our 7 mile round trip with 700 feet of gain, we went back to the Selby parking area where we high tailed it over to Painted Rock. It is a ¼ mile hike to Painted Rock from the Visitors Center. This is one of the best examples of Native American rock art in the country. It was getting dark as we toured the visitors center on our way back.

David Zalewski joined Dave Eisenberg and me to camp on the plain near the turn off from the Soda Lake Road. Everyone else drove home. The next day the 3 of us bagged Reyes and Haddock in 8 miles and 1200 feet of gain. Just after we turned off for Haddock the use trail became indistinct, so a little time was wasted to get up to the ridge for Haddock. Don't forget your Adventure Pass to park where the trail starts off from the dirt road for these 2 peaks. This road closes after the first heavy rain at Hwy 33 and doesn't open until the following Spring. It is suitable for any high or semi-high clearance vehicles when open. 4x4 vehicles are not necessary.

We all had a great weekend under great weather conditions.

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### **Black Mountain #4 and Meeks** **7-8 February 1998** **By Rob Langsdorf**

All week the forecast was for storms to pound Southern California for the whole weekend. It made me think about canceling this Wilderness Basics Course Car Camp, or changing it to lower elevations. Friday afternoon it poured and lowered the snow level too much for Granite Peaks, but we decided to go for Black & Meeks.

6:30 am departure Saturday from San Diego. We enjoyed a great breakfast at Grandma's Kitchen in Banning (the new location is on the south side of the street). The Pioneer Town Road from Yucca Valley to Rim Rock had many places where Friday's storm had swept sand and water onto the road. The road through Burns Canyon was still wet with

At 11:25 am, with somewhat sunny skies, we strolled east down the section line (sections 25 & 36) road to Antelope Creek. Clear water flowed along about half our two mile walk down this canyon. But it was shallow enough to provide easy crossings. We climb up the side canyon in section 29 to the point where it forks, then up the SW ridge to the summit. On top the snow was about 3 inches deep. This register is falling apart, though the can set is still good. On our trip return we took a more direct route from the summit to the junction of the side canyon with Antelope Creek.

The sky was getting much more threatening when we returned to our vehicles. So we headed for lower ground north of Landers. We found relief from the wind on the east side of Spy Mountain in a trashed BLM site at only 2500'. After leisurely consuming mexican food around a campfire, we hit the sack just in time to spend a comfortable night listening to the rain on our tents.

Sunday we slept in until 8 am to let a drying sun replace the rain. Soon a nearby lake produced a fog bank. As we ate breakfast, this fog lifted and the lake was gone.

There were many mud puddles on the drive into Meeks, but it only required high clearance to get over one rocky spot. We saw no indications of the rumored Red Stakes anywhere along the road into the burned down cabin. It appeared that the jeep road, which is followed for the first part of the climb, had been used recently.

Our climb of Meeks was warm in the sunshine, but the wind turned cool on the summit. The mountains to the west were covered with snow. I had asked about doing this peak from the Southwest. But there is a private dwelling, with about 6 vehicles around it, only .3 miles from the summit. Probably not a wise route to use.

Our drive home was dry until we got to I-10. Then it poured most of the way home. Thanks to Craig Denson, who assisted me. The WBC students who came were: Mark Brown, Joe Risser and his son, Nick. The rain had scared five others away.

## **Brown Mountain**

Eleven hikers participated in this successful outing on a day which ended with heavy rain throughout California. But the rain held off until after this hike was concluded, except for occasional heavy mist or sprinkles the last hour of the hike.

Because we were sure that Millard Canyon, Stag's usual choice for ascending Brown Mtn, would have much water, making stream crossings problematic, we chose to drive to Eaton Saddle to begin and end the hike. At about 8:45 AM Stag led the group from Eaton Saddle through Mueller Tunnel, past the San Gabriel/Markham Saddle, and down the Mt Lowe Road to the upper trail to Tom Sloan Saddle (where one participant checked out), then on to Brown. We arrived at the summit of Brown at 10:40 AM. The coolness of the day limited our lunch break to 20 minutes, and we departed at 11:00 AM. Back at Tom Sloan Saddle, Stag turned over leadership to Bobcat, who led the group on a trail to the Mt Lowe Road which connects the road near the site of Alpine Tavern. We chose to hike the east trail over Mt Lowe after traveling down the road a short ways. Bobcat led the group to the junction with the trail to the summit of Mt Lowe, at which point Joe led.

Hiking in snow 3-4 inches deep and in light rain, Joe led the group back to the San Gabriel/Markham Saddle and back to the cars, arriving shortly after 2:00 PM.

The only problem the group faced today was surmounting a ten+ foot high pile of snow (no doubt the residue of an avalanche this week) at the west end of Mueller Tunnel. Most hikers climbed on top of the snow pile, though some risked going around it in spite of the drop off from the road.

Seven of the hikers reconvened at Pepe's of La Cañada afterwards. We toasted Stag on account of his upcoming birthday and successful outing to Brown Mtn.

## **Asbestos Mtn**

**February 14, 1998**

Eight hikers participated in this Valentine's Day outing cut short by rain. After driving to the 2WD trailhead, six of the eight made a round trip climb in 2 hours; Patty and Frank Goodykoontz took an additional ½ hour. Moderate rain began at 11:00 AM, while six of us were on the summit, and became heavy rain by the time most had returned to their vehicles. The heavy rain lasted until after 4:00 PM in LA.

The group followed the standard route directions per the peak guide dated January 20, 1997. The hiking directions are accurate. It cannot be overemphasized that one should proceed from the vehicles to the gully leading to the left of the large boulder and stay in the gully, following a ducked route. In addition, the comment "for an easy route to the summit, go to the top of the gully and look for ducks on the right..." should be heeded. In fact, once beyond the large boulder, a series of fragmented grassy ducked routes curve around the south and east sides of the summit winding up just below the summit on its northeast side. Following this series avoids much boulder-hopping on the summit rock pile.

The driving directions in the peak guide require two changes. First, there is an instruction to "go east on Hwy 74 to Desert Center." Obviously, the reference should be to the town of *Mountain* Center, not Desert Center. [It should be noted that Peak Guides 28E through 30D, a total of 20 guides, contain this error.] Also, there is a statement, "at 2.3 miles, end of pavement. 2WD vehicles should park here." There is no pavement.

## **SHAY, INGHAM, LITTLE SHAY, & HAWES**

**7-8 March, 1998**

7:30 Saturday morning 7 of us met at the Bob's Big Boy in Hesperia on Main Street just west of I-15. After a good breakfast we

drive up the Coxey Road to Little Pine Flat. The Mojave River was flowing under the Rock Springs Road, but fresh asphalt indicated that it had recently flowed over it. The Coxey road had several new foot deep gullies cutting across it, but 4WD was not needed.

The road from Little Pine Flat to Hawes Ranch was permanently closed a few years back as mitigation for the green sticker power bike trail that now ruins the Holcomb Creek Trail Camp and goes nearly over the top of Hawes.

We had planned to backpack into Barrel Springs and day hike Deer and Shay from there. But the snow level was down to 5900' and this San Diego Wilderness Basics Outing was not suppose to be a snow camp. Besides it was Paul DeKleemalker's first backpack trip. So we found a nice flat spot on the ridge 200 yards west of the Hawes Ranch site and leisurely set up camp there.

After lunch we followed a flagged route through the snow to the Saddle west of Little Shay. From there our travel was fairly snow free along the old ridge cat track to the base of Shay. The southeast ridge of Shay now has a broad firebreak up it to the southwest summit. From there a good cat track goes to the summit. Deep snow coverage on Butler and Craft to the south and the San Gabriels west of Cajon Pass provided spectacular views.

For those looking for a pathfinder route up Shay, it appears that you could follow a cat track up the southeast ridge of 6592' to about the 6200' level. There another cat track leads around the east slope of Shay to the southeast ridge's firebreak.

From Shay we followed the cat trails south to Ingham and then northeast to Little Shay. Then we plunge stepped down the north slope of Little Shay through 1 - 3 foot deep snow. Dirk Addis led us on a route that managed to avoid most of the scrub oaks as we dropped to the creek below Cup Spring. We were back in camp in time to set up for a great campfire/kitchen site before it got dark.

Sunday, we crossed the creek directly from the old Hawes Ranch campsite and went down stream about 50' to the cat track that lead up the ridge to Hawes Peak. This use trail is still in

good condition. From the summit we dropped directly north down a snow filled gully. This would be an excellent route for anyone trying to return to Little Pine Flat directly from the summit of Hawes. We turned west down an old jeep track south of Cox Creek to return to our camp and were out to the vehicles early in the afternoon.

On the way back to San Diego we took the University exit from the 60/I-215 west to Iowa Street for ARCO gas that was priced 15 to 20 cents lower than anything in San Diego County. Just west of Iowa Street is a mexican restaurant called "Joe Aguilair's Templo Del Sol. We enjoyed excellent food there for very reasonable prices.

Other students on this trip were Mark Brown, Amber Hildreth, and Afra Roet.

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## **A Weekend of Peakbagging in Joshua Tree National Park**

**April 4-5, 1998**

**Leaders: Joe Young & Jim Fleming**

Heavy rains and snow at low elevations have wreaked havoc with HPS outings recently, so it was great to complete an outing and bag all advertised peaks.

Seven hikers met at the Oasis Visitor Center in Twentynine Palms Saturday morning. Joe asked one Park Ranger about the condition of the roads along the Geology Trail which we drive across to get to Little Berdoo and Bernard, and she said that it was very muddy. Another Ranger said that the problem was blowing dust in the area. He also said that 4WD vehicles only were permitted along the Geology Trail.

After paying the \$10 per car entry fee, good for one week, the group caravanned to the turn-off from the paved road to the Geology Trail. The seven of us consolidated into two 4WD vehicles which then headed off to the peaks. It turned out that the condition of the roads was excellent – little mud, little dust. We drove about 0.2 mile past the route 1 roadhead because there was more room to get the vehicles completely off the road. We began our hike to Little Berdoo at 9:30. Joe led back up the road, then west cross country until he spotted the main wash. He proceeded up the

main wash, pausing briefly to check out tributary washes until he found the fork in the main wash described in the peak guide. Joe wanted to bag Little Berdoo first because both peaks would be pathfinder routes for him. Joe led up the left wash all the way until it topped out, then proceeded southwest over one bump to the summit of Little Berdoo. This had taken about 1¼ hour.

After a brief snack, Jim led the group over to Bernard, which took about ½ hour. After examining the very old register on Bernard (both it and Little Berdoo had registers going back over 25 years) and another brief snack, Jim led a quick descent down the fun ridge heading south from the summit. After he arrived in the main wash down stream of the fork, Joe led the group out. Joe passed by the spot in the wash, marked by a large duck, where he had entered it earlier in the day and followed the main wash all the way out to the road. He led the group back up the road for about 0.3 mile to the cars, noting that there were numerous places to pull off the road near where the road crosses the wash. The group arrived at the two vehicles at about 1:30 PM.

We drove back out to the paved road and unloaded passengers. At this point Joe had to leave the group so he could drive to Compton to participate in a meeting. Jim and deputized assistant Sharry Puraty led Ryan, Lost Horse, and Inspiration.

The hike to Ryan, via the slightly steep trail, was done at a moderate pace and we summited in about 45 minutes. There were six participants. We had to do Lost Horse rather quickly, as the route to the mine is signed for "Day Use Only"--closed between 6:00 PM and 8:00 AM! We pushed hard to the summit, arriving in less than an hour and enjoyed deepening shadows across the desert with fine views of snow clad San Gorgonio and San Jacinto to the west. We had 5 participants for this hike. At dusk we began our final ascent of the day -- Inspiration --with four participants. The Park Service has built a trail to the first false summit (a bit steep) and a climber's use trail leads over to the second (which Jim mistook for the true summit briefly until he checked his map and write-up). The return to

the cars after bagging Inspiration was conducted by flashlight.

Jim then led the caravan to our reserved group campsite at Indian Cove. Several folks opted for dinner at Arturos Mexican Restaurant in Joshua Tree along the way (food fair, large portions). It was now getting fairly late in the evening. Judy Ware and John Connelly happened to be here as well, so it was a fortuitous choice! They would join us on Sunday.

After dinner those camping at Indian Cove were unpleasantly surprised to find that because our vehicles were parked in the dirt that we would be fined \$50! The Park Service citation indicated the violation to be "Off Road Travel"! We must be careful to learn about their regulations!

The next morning seven hikers, five holdovers from Saturday plus two new hikers, met at Quail Springs Picnic Site. The hike of Quail began at about 8:35 AM. Joe led the group southwesterly across the desert floor, up a wash, over a ridge, down to another wash, then northwesterly over another ridge, across another wash, all the while attempting the find hiking route 1 as shown on the peak guide. He was unable to find this route. After conferring with Jim and others, Joe decided to head westerly up a ridge which tops out at 4680', then southwest to a saddle, then south toward peak 5405' located east of Quail Peak. That portion of the hike traversed the best terrain we were to find. We contoured around peak 5405', then headed west, then southwest to catch the main ridge reading northwesterly to Quail. It had taken us 2 hours 50 minutes to reach the summit. We were chagrined to find no register on the summit, only a damaged ammo can. The summit was cool and occasionally breezy, with skies partly cloudy.

After a brief lunch Joe led back to peak 5405', then followed a ridge easterly to peak 5041', from which point Joe headed north down its face, again attempting to find evidence of hiking route 1. Again, there was no evidence of such a route. The terrain became rougher, with large boulders and cliffs. We worked northeasterly, finally meeting a dry wash, which we followed for a ways. There were numerous

waterfalls to descend in this wash. When Joe felt he was even with the ridge he had earlier led the group up (the ridge leading to 4680'+ west of the main wash), he decided to go east, straight up the hill to the top of a ridge from whence he could see the picnic area where the cars were parked. Joe followed another ridge east which ended in a dry wash, then followed the wash, with another couple of waterfalls, out to the desert floor. Joe then headed northeast, then east, finally meeting the dirt road north of the picnic area.

We arrived at the cars at approximately 2:30 PM. It had taken us about six hours to complete this hike of Quail. The peak guide says that hiking route 1, which involves 9 miles, all cross country, should take 3-4 hours! This implies that a group should be able to sustain an average speed of 3 mph on cross country terrain. No way, José! The peak guide also says that route 1 involves 2250' of gain. There is enough up and down to gain well over 3,000' on this outing. [Route 2 is probably just as inaccurate.]

Recommendation: If you're interested in pathfinding on a navigation noodle type outing, try hiking route 1 for Quail. On the other hand, for a direct, straightforward ascent begin your hike at Hidden Valley picnic area and head westerly across the desert floor, and ascend Quail via the ridge southeast of the peak. It may still take 5 - 6 hours to complete, but it's a much simpler trip.

At this point only four hikers wanted to hike Queen, so we consolidated into two trucks and proceeded to the trailhead for Queen Mtn. Joe led an uneventful hike of Queen which took 2 hours and 50 minutes round trip, including a brief snack on the summit. The driving directions on the peak guide for Queen are precisely correct. The hiking directions are obsolete and inconsistent. The standard route for Queen involves 4 mi rt on trail and ducked route, with 1,200' of gain. The directions should say: From the cars hike about : mile up a dirt road to its end. From this point follow an obvious and ducked trail leading eastward, and upward, where the trail meets up with a wide gully. From this point a ducked route heads upward, generally following the west (left) side

of the gully. Follow the ducked route as it tops out above the gully. The summit is to your left at this point. Follow a use trail as it contours around the east side of the summit. The route curves around to the north side of the summit, then heads south to the summit block.

After returning passengers to their cars at Quail Springs Picnic area, the four hikers drove out to Yucca Valley and dined at the Carrows Restaurant.

Thanks to Jim Fleming for pinch-hitting for Maggie Wilson who had a conflict this weekend. Jim led or co-led all seven peaks this weekend.

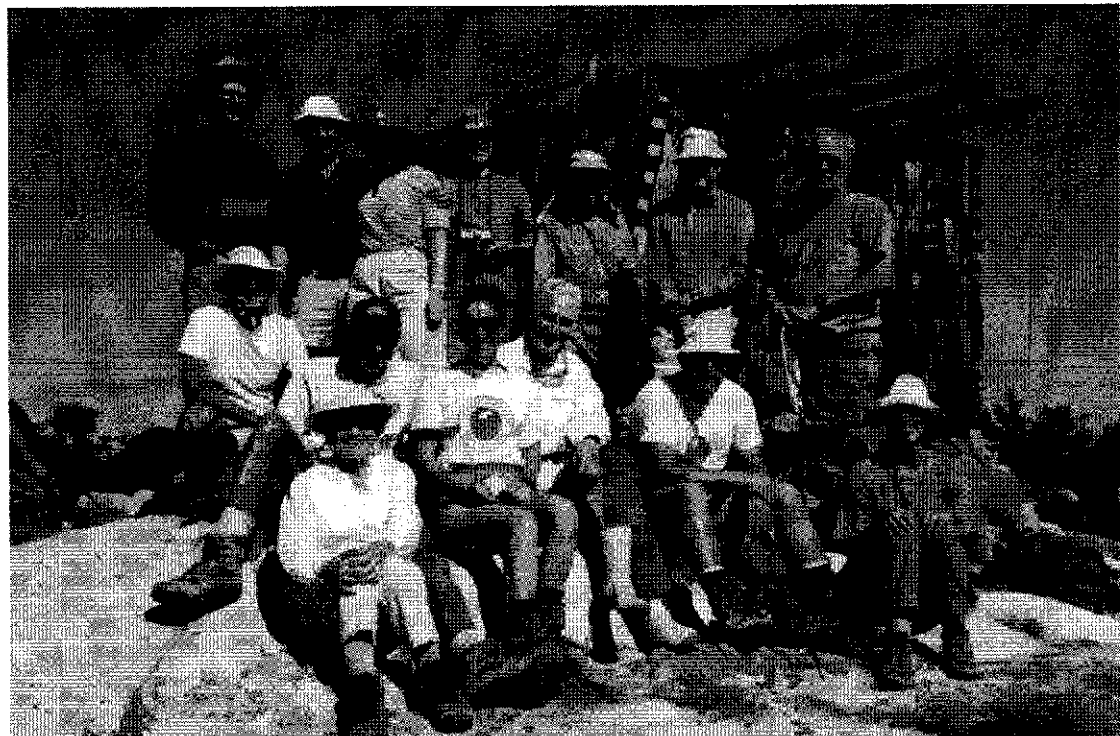
